### COURSE DESCRIPTION

This is a general education survey course to introduce students to the impacts and interactions of information, people, and technology. This course will address major questions such as: What are the basic components of technology? How is technology evolving over time? How can we use technology to organize and make sense of information? How can technology help individuals, society, and organizations adapt rapidly and creatively? How is technology changing the human experience? What are the negative, positive, and future impacts of today's technologies?

### COURSE OBJECTIVES

At the end of this course, you should:

- Understand the basics of hardware, software, data management, and networking technologies
- Identify the impact that information technologies (IT) can have on individuals, society, and organizations, as well as the impact that individuals, society, and organizations can have on IT;
- Better understand yourself as a user and consumer of IT;
- Learn how to critically evaluate the design of IT;
- Use the Design-Thinking framework to evaluate an existing IT design, then propose and prototype a re-design that improves the usability of the original design.

### COURSE STRUCTURE

There are four modules in this course:

- 1) **IT Fundamentals:** Hardware, software, databases, and networks
- 2) **IT & Society:** Social and community informatics
- 3) **IT & Organizations:** Information technologies in the enterprise
- 4) **IT & Individuals:** Human-computer interactions and interfaces

For each module, you will have prep work (readings or videos), lectures, homework assignments, in-class activities, and quizzes. There will also be a team project during Module 4.

## COURSE MATERIALS

There is no textbook for this course. All lecture powerpoints and readings/videos will be available on Canvas (the new course management system that replaced ANGEL). If you have any questions about Canvas, please visit <http://canvas.psu.edu/students/> or talk to the LAs and instructor.

Please note that additions or changes to the topics and the assigned reading/video list may occur as we move through the course, so **always reference the Calendar and Module tabs for the most recent assignments, due dates, prep work, and events**. When a change is made to the calendar, the instructor will immediately notify students (in class and via email) and make the appropriate changes in Canvas.

### **Quizzes:**

Quizzes will cover material presented during lectures and as part of the assigned preparations (readings/videos). All content for the quizzes can be found directly on the powerpoint slides; therefore, students are not required to take notes in class, but note-taking is encouraged if it helps facilitate learning.

There will be three quizzes total. Prior to the quiz, there will be a study guide distributed to students and an in-class review session. Students will have access to the full lecture powerpoints on Canvas and should review these prior to the quiz.

All quizzes must be taken in-class on the date specified on the Canvas Calendar. Quizzes are individual assessments - Sharing answers with others or using external materials will constitute an academic integrity violation for all students involved.

If a student cannot be in class on the day of the quiz, it is the student's responsibility to notify the instructor before the quiz day and arrange a time to make-up the quiz. If a student does not notify the instructor and does not take the quiz in-class, he/she will receive a zero for the quiz.

### **Homework:**

Homework assignments are found on Canvas and will be made visible at least one week before the due date. These assignments are individual assessments and students should not work with other students when completing their homework. Any sharing or copying answers from other students will constitute an academic integrity violation for all students involved.

Homework must be submitted in Canvas by the beginning of class on the day that it is due (4:00pm). Due dates are found on the *Modules, Assignments, and Calendar* areas of Canvas. If students have any issues with uploading their homework, they should email the homework to the instructor or print it and hand it to the instructor before the start of class on the due date.

Students can receive extensions on homework due dates if they have a discussion with the instructor before the due date. The student and instructor will decide on an appropriate extension due date. If a student does not submit the homework assignment by the deadline (or agreed upon make-up date if there is an extension) then he/she will receive a zero for the assignment.

***In-Class Activities:***

Students will work in assigned teams and complete several in-class activities during the semester. The in-class activities will require that each team complete an activity and submit it by the end of class with only the names of team members who helped complete the activity in class. All materials needed to complete the activity will be available in Canvas.

If a student is unable to come to class on the day of an in-class activity, then the student must notify the instructor and LAs of their absence before class. This will result in an “excused absence,” which means that the student can complete the activity on his/her own. Students are only allowed a reasonable amount of excused absences. It is the student’s responsibility to know if he/she will miss an activity and notify the instructor and LAs. The student must submit the activity by the start of the next class. More specifically:

- If the activity occurred in class on Monday, the student must submit the completed activity by 4:00pm on Wednesday of the same week.
- If the activity occurred in class on Wednesday, the student must submit the completed activity by 4:00pm the following Monday.

If students do not submit the activity as a team (during class) or within the make-up deadline (if they have an “excused absence”), then they will receive a zero for the activity.

***Design Challenge:***

Students will work in assigned teams to complete a design challenge, which will be a guided in-class activity over the course of 2 weeks. All team members must be in class on the design challenge days. If students cannot attend class during this time, then they should notify the instructor and their team members about the absence.

If there is an issue among team members, the team members can follow the steps in the “*Team Participation Policy*” posted in Canvas to resolve the situation.

***Self & Team Evaluation:***

Students will evaluate themselves and their teammates at the end of the semester. The evaluations will be based on four factors: the team members’ *engagement, problem-solving skills, professionalism, and contribution* during the in-class activities and the design challenge.

**Late Submissions:**

To encourage good time management skills, late submissions will **not be accepted** in this class. Students should note that Canvas dropboxes close at the deadline time specified for the assignment (either the start of class or midnight). Any homework or in-class activity received after the due date will receive a zero.

There are two exceptions to this policy:

- 1) *Extensions:* If a student cannot come to class due to illness or unavoidable circumstances, then the student must inform the instructor of the situation before the due date of the assignment. The instructor and student will then decide on an extended due date based on the student’s circumstance.
- 2) *Half-Credit:* Each student will get only one opportunity to submit a late assignment (homework or in-class activity), which will be graded for half-credit. The late assignment must be emailed to the instructor within one week of the original due date. It is the student’s responsibility to follow-up with the instructor to submit the assignment for half-credit, as the instructor will not remind the student of this opportunity.
